Year 5's Blog

In Maths this week we have been continuing our unit of number and place value. We have been writing 7 digit numbers in words and ordering numbers in ascending order (which means which smallest to largest). To order numbers, you have to first count how many digits are in each number. The numbers with fewer digits are the smallest. Then, you have to compare the highest value digits within the number first. Some of us have been finding the halfway point between two numbers, such as: find the

exact halfway number between 8,960,000 and 9,040,000. To work this out, you have to do a column subtraction sum to find the difference. Then you can half the answer and add it to the lower number. E.g. 9,040,000 - 8,960,000 = 80,000. Half of 80,000 = 40,000. Some of us answered questions which require reasoning skills.

In RE our key theological concept is 'Gospel'. The Gospel accounts are found in the first 4 books of the New Testament: Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. This is where we learn about the miracles of Jesus. This week we learnt about the miracle of The Wedding at Cana, where Jesus turned water into wine, and can be found in John 2:1-11. We considered the question: what is the difference between magic and miracles? Miracles are divine acts or 'signs' which point to the nature of God, whereas magic's purpose is purely to entertain and show off the magician's skills!

In Science we have been learning about the solar system and compared the sizes of the planets with fruit and vegetables. We also know the names of all the planets in order by a rhyme: (my very educated mother just served us nachos) Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune. We discussed the difference between orbiting and rotating. Then, we did some outdoor learning where we created our very own human Y5 solar system! Fun fact: did you know that the Sun is so large that it could contain over a million planet Earths?

In English we learnt about a story called The Highwayman. We did some research about real highwaymen, such as Dick Turpin, and wrote in bullet points and paragraphs about what a highwayman is. On Tuesday, we identified descriptive words and phrases in the first two stanzas which build up an image for the reader, and then we illustrated the described scene. In our big write, we are writing persuasive job descriptions for a highwayman. *By Avi and Ehsan*.

Maths

Firstly, we wrote 7 digit numbers in our book and circled the place value we were we had a small test to see where all of us were (skill-based). Then we supposed to and wrote the value of the number down.

English

In English we're reading a story called the Girl of Ink and Stars we analysed a small part of the book and split it in two parts: language features, text structures. Then we proof read our big write and edited it. After we edited our work we redrafted the paragraph; for this we needed words such as adjectives, adverbs, verbs and much more. We also started a word bank from the book we're reading.

Science

In science we are learning about the circulatory system and the heart. We Watched a video of the human body and how it works, we also wrote notes on the white board to help us with our learning. We had to answer questions about circulatory system in animals.

DT

In DT we explored the school, attempting to find different chairs and sketch them. We also wrote under the sketch what material it was made from and who it's suitable for and how it was constructed.

RE

In RE we did a special lesson with miss Kennedy about our life-history and what experiences have been challenging. We are also performing a play of the good Samaritan for Friday's Assembly. *By Mohamad and Ricari*






