
NAIDOC Week

Dear Joey,

Many years ago I was born into slavery working in a big house for quite a long time. Suddenly my master got really sick he begged me to come closer and he said 'Henry you are a good worker I'm selling you to my son be good and never tell a lie.'

So I went to his son and got torn from my family, but that's the way the cookie crumbles. So I had to work in a tobacco factory the boss was insane he yelled so much and the rules were so strict; he would even beat you if you dint do what he said I could not handle it.

Once when I was walking around, I met a lady called Nancy, she was shopping for her mistress. We walked and talked, she was a slave as well, when she had done shopping we agreed to meet again. I hummed all the way home! Next time we met and I asked her to be my wife and our two bosses agreed for us to be married. We had children. Suddenly Nancy's boss had lost a lot of money that we were worried they will sell our children. Nancy then at lunch James (my friend) said 'Your wife and kids were sold on the slave market.' I sat very still. 'Twist that tobacco!' said my master my heart twisted in my chest. I was lifting crates that's when I got the idea to mail myself to Philadelphia so I knew I had to fake an injury so I poured vitriol oil on my hand and it burned to bone.

Dr Smith bandaged it and showed it to my master so he would let me take the day off. We met the next morning at an old warehouse. I came with a box, I climbed in it and he nailed it down and he put me on the cart then on boat then cart then I arrived in Philadelphia. A couple of men opened the box and all of them said 'WELCOME TO PHILADELPHIA!' and from that day I was a free man and I had a new birthday, it was 30th March 1849.




