

Maths: In maths we have been dividing by tens and hundreds for example, 375 divided by 10 is 37.5.

We also added two fractions together, for example, 4/8 + 2/8 + 3/8 = 9/8. We also did subtracting fractions like 40/8 - 7/8 = 33/8.

English: In English, we learnt about direct speech and indirect speech. Direct speech is when you put an inverted comma and speech marks before and after someone is speaking. Indirect speech is when someone says something, but the text doesn't show speech marks. We had to correct sentences by adding direct speech and on our work sheet, on the last question we had to write if the boy was correct or not. 




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LETTER FROM OUR CHAIR OF GOVERNORS
