# Year 6's Blog

In English we have been writing our own descriptive and action paragraphs. We have been describing and making our own characters from a picture of a sinister castle. Sensibly, we worked with partners for the descriptive paragraph and our presentation was immaculate by using adverbs, adjectives, interesting sentence start-

ers, expanded noun phrases, fronted adverbials, powerful verbs and having neat handwriting. In our action paragraph you had the choice to make your own character and write in 3rd person or the character to be yourself and write in 1st person.

In Maths we have been learning about angles and four different types of triangles [Scalene, Isosceles, Equilateral and Right angle]. We have done right angles, reflex angles, obtuse angles and acute angles. Acute angles are angles that are less than 90 degrees, Right angles are angles that are exactly 90 degrees and always have a little square where the Right angle is, Obtuse angles are angles that are more than 90 degrees, but less than 180 degrees, Reflex angles are angles that are more than 180 degrees but less than 360 degrees [180 degrees is a flat, straight line]. A Scalene triangle is a triangle with all its angles and sides are all different measurements, an Isosceles triangle is a triangle with two of its angles and sides the same measurements, an Equilateral triangle is a triangle with all its angles and sides exactly 60 degrees and a Right Angled triangle is a triangle that has a right angle.

In Science we have been learning about Evolution and Inheritance, Environmental Traits and Inherited Traits. Inherited means you have a feature that's been received from family and Evolution was when animals where tiny cell organisms and when gorillas were evolved to become humans. Environmental Traits are if you have a feature that you have because of your environment and Inherited Traits are if you have a feature that you have from your ancestors and family. 

#### HEAD TEACHER'S LETTER

Dear St Cuthbert children and parents,

Although plenty of great learning has taken place in Earls Court this week, I thought it would be lovely for us to head over to Wales and share with you some of the happenings down at the farm. And so, from pulling potatoes to visiting the smallest city in the United Kingdom, my newsletter today is covering some interesting territories...

If you have been scrolling through our website, you may just have spotted these photographs together with some charming blogs (coming all the way from a distant corner in the Welsh countryside) detailing the antics of our roaming children:







DAY 1: ... "Last night we were all told by our teachers that we would be woken up at 6:45am sharp. Sounds early, doesn't it? Well, it wasn't early for us! We were all so excited that in the blink of an eye all of us were dressed by 7:00! Then, we dragged ourselves to the boot room where we put on our wellington boots and all of our waterproof clothing. We went out to feed the cockerels (called 'Black Rocks'), and some of us became friends with a very kind cockerel who we named Alex. We also had to feed pigs, geese and turkeys. Then, we cleaned our boots and headed back to the warm, cosy cottage to have breakfast. We were greeted to the inviting smell of croissants and toast."

DAY 5: "...Second task of the day involved getting our boots/ trainers on at 9:45 am for our amazing adventure to St David's city. Did you know that St David's was the capital city of Wales about 1000 years ago and is the smallest city in United Kingdom? We travelled there by foot which was good exercise – in fact, our technology tells us that we have walked

over 17,000 steps today! As the city of St David's came into sight amidst the rolling hills, the first thing that took our surprise was the majestic St David's Cathedral. It features a slightly purplish hue as it was built using slate stone from the local quarry, and it is nestled within a dip in the ground (this was to protect it from attackers during the Anglo-Saxon period). Dating back to the 6th century, it is one of the oldest cathedrals in the UK. Notably, it is also home to the tomb of Edmund Tudor – King Henry VIII's father."

DAY 6: "In the afternoon, we have been busy picking thistles and pulling potatoes from the ground and putting them into buckets. These then went into a big bag attached to a tractor. We couldn't end our day without making sure our pigs and poultry were fed. For the pigs, as we walked through the gate, we had to hold our buckets of food high and walk forward. One child had to walk to the other side of the field to act as a decoy to distract the pig while the other poured the food into the trough. We are about to enjoy our velvety hot chocolate before bedtime!"

DAY 7: "In group A we went to the sheep and lambs; we got to hold the little, adorable and heart-warming lambs. We also got to feed rams that were probably starving out in the bitterly cold field. We put the food in the six troughs that were provided in the luscious, green field.....

What can we say? It has been truly unforgettable. That said, we are excited to be reunited with our families to-morrow!"

After all these exciting adventures, it is back to city-living this weekend for our 'farm labourers'. We are so grateful to our team of teachers for supporting our children for this week-long stay. We are also extremely grateful to Dan (the farm manager) and his team for ensuring that our St Cuthbert children had such a truly memorable time; and to Friends of Lower Treginnis Charity for supporting us financially - enabling this trip to take place: THANK YOU!

And so I am signing off for another week. I look forward to sharing with you our news about city-learning next week!



English we have been learning about traditional tales. We read Hansel and Gretel and later we are going to write our own story that has a witch character in it.






# NOTICE TO PARENTS Parking
