Year 6's Blog

This week in Maths our main focus has been Place Value. We have been reading, writing, ordering and comparing numbers up to 1,000,000 and determining their values. Some of the numbers were: 6,248,917, 5,075,400 and many more. We highlighted some of the digits in the numbers and focused on what their value is. As well as this, we have been converting different units of measure such as: km to m, l to cl, cl to ml and others. Some of us also learnt that there is a unit called centilitre (cl). In English we have been given setting images by Miss Putterill which have been extremely strange and have been set the task to create stories based on what we see. Yesterday, we were using different language features to create short paragraphs about pictures set in weird settings. The first picture we described we did as a class and the second one is where Miss Putterill tested us on how much knowledge we gained. It was a good test and we're sure that we all passed.


In Science we have been focusing on the structure of the human heart and circulatory system. An example of one of the facts we learned is: the human heart is a muscle that contracts and relaxes. We also discovered how it pumps blood to the lungs and the rest of the body in a double circulation. Did you know that your body is made up of a pump (your heart), blood, blood vessels, arteries, ventricles and much more. We learnt that our heart is a bag-like pump and is the size of your clenched fist.

In RE, the topic we are learning about is Life and Death. Our first lesson was aimed at drawing a timeline and putting down special dates and events which are significant to us. On Wednesday, we read part of a book called 'Children Also Grieve'. We thought it would be a good idea to give the book to someone who is grieving since the book would make them feel as if they are safe and can rely on someone to express their emotions who wouldn't spread their information to anyone. We created different thought bubbles which were brainstorming on the topics: Coping with Grief and Symptoms of Grief. Many of us completed the extension and wrote detailed paragraphs.

In Science we were drawing bugs on card and we used watercolours. We drew lines going diagonal, straight and across. We had a picture that we copied. My picture was a snail.



Year 5’s Blog

In English we have been continuing learning about The Highwayman by Alfred Noyes. We have been studying figurative language Noyes uses such as similes and metaphors: ‘His eyes were hollows of madness’; ‘his hair was like mouldy hay’; ‘dumb as a dog he listened’.

We wrote diary entries from Tim’s point of view. Tim loves the landlord’s daughter, Bess, and is mad with rage when he sees the highwayman with Bess, and hears him exclaim that he will return to her with yellow gold by moonlight. Our diary entries had to include rich vocabulary found in the poem, such as: stable-wicket, red love-knot, casement, stirrups and cascade. We used empathy to imagine how Tim must have felt, and used words to describe this such as: heartbroken, destitute, envious, vengeful and bitter.

In Science we have been continuing our learning about Space and Earth. We learnt that the Earth rotates on its axis (an imaginary pole from the North Pole to the South Pole) at a tilt. This is what causes night and day. At any one point, half of the Earth is facing towards the Sun – this is day time – and half of the Earth is facing away from the Sun – this is night time. We had to give a written explanation for why do we have day and night? We had a word bank of scientific vocabulary that we could tick off as we went along. We also learnt about the eight phases of the moon. Our extension was to explain what happens during a lunar and solar eclipse.

This week in Maths we’ve been learning about counting back and on in steps 1,000, 10,000 and 100,000. For example: counting back 80 from 7414 is 7334. Some of us worked this out mentally. For trickier questions, we used the formal column method.

In our RE lesson we have been continuing our key concept (Gospel) by looking at Jesus’ miracles. We have been talking about Jesus calming down the storm. At first, his disciples panicked and didn’t believe he would save them, but Jesus calmed the storm. We thought about what the miracles teaches Christians today. The miracle encourages Christians to call out to God through prayer during stormy times in life, and to have faith even when it feels like God doesn’t care, as he is always there guiding quietly. *By Crina and Rhia*

And of course, our coming weekend!






