

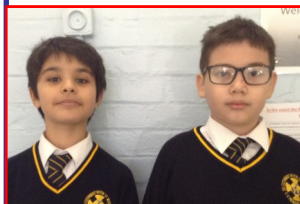

Year 5's Blog

In Maths, we have been learning about the formal column method for short and long multiplication. When you use the formal written method you need to multiply the digits in stages. For example, if you had to multiply 326 by 24, you would first multiply each digit by the 4, and then multiply each digit by the 20. We have also been multiplying and dividing

whole numbers and decimal numbers by 10, 100 and 1000. We have been using Espresso to recall our understanding of factors.

In Spanish we have been learning about the Day of the Dead. On the day itself, people buy Catrina which are skulls made of sugar and at their houses they make altars adorned with pictures and flowers. They also make a bread which is called 'Pan De Muerto'.

In History we are working our way through our timeline of crime and punishment, beginning with the Romans, continuing to the Anglo-Saxons, Tudors, Georgians, Victorians and finally modern times. This week we learnt about Roman punishments and thought about whether they were fair or not fair. Some punishments in Roman times were: execution, exile and pillory. Execution is for committing a crime punishable by death, exile is being removed from your homeland or country forever and pillory is getting stuck in a wooden block and possibly having food thrown at you! The Roman justice system has left a legacy today, as they had a court, with a judge, a jury and witnesses.

National Portrait Gallery trip

On Thursday, we visited the National Portrait



Gallery, which was commissioned by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert. We studied a range of portraiture, focusing particularly on this abstract painting by Patrick Heron of T S Eliot. We noticed that there is an

overlapping profile and front on view, to create a sort of 3D image. Using a sculpture in the gallery, we created outlines of the front and profile view, and then rotated and translated these to create our own artwork in this style. *By Tristan and Aun*

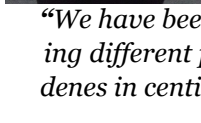

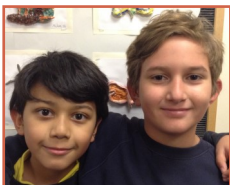


Mario Y2 "In Art we used a marbling effect and silhouettes to make our Fire of London picture."

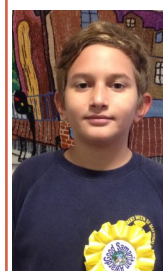

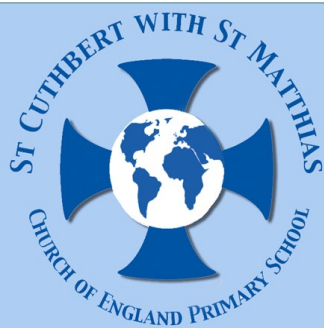
