Year 5's Blog

History

This week we have been continuing our learning on crime and punishment through the ages. Anglo-Saxon (AD 820-1066) communities were commonly made up of things: groups of 10 men who were responsible for

each other's behaviour. If a man in the tithing committed a crime, it was up to the other men to make sure he went to court! If they didn't, they would all face punishment.

In court, if there weren't enough oath-keepers (modern day witnesses), or if the defendant insisted they were innocent, then the case might go to a trial by ordeal. Anglo-Saxons believed that it was then up to God to decide if the person was innocent or guilty. There were three main ordeals, the first one was the cold water ordeal, the second one was the hot water ordeal and last but not least: the iron bar ordeal. Do you think this was a fair justice system?

Maths

In Maths we have been learning about cube numbers and square numbers. We used the formal written method and we used our time table facts. For example, the calculation for 3^3 is 3x3x3 which is 27 or 7^3 is 7x7x7 which is 343. We used our reasoning by answering questions like 'always, sometimes, never'. Today, we began our new unit of fractions, where we ordered a group of fractions with different denominators. We had to find the lowest common multiple to create equivalent fractions with the same denominator. Then, we can order the fractions easily by looking at the numerators.

English

In English we learnt about like IPEELL which stands for introduction, points, elaboration, ending, links and language. Also, the mnemonic PAT stands for purpose, audience and text type. By Ilya and Max






