

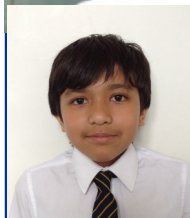
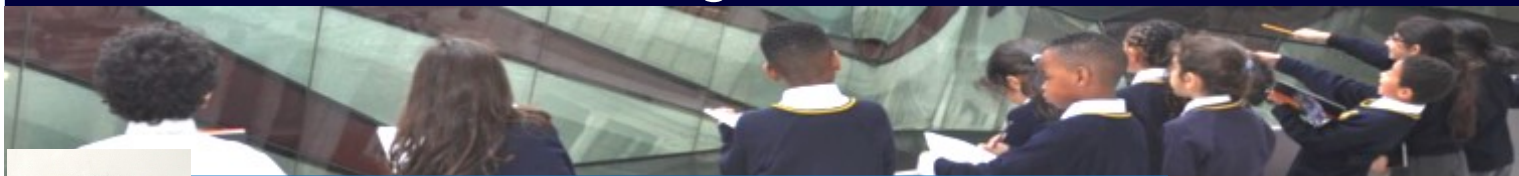

On Thursday, we went to Hyde Park to see an interactive concert named ‘Chickenshed’.



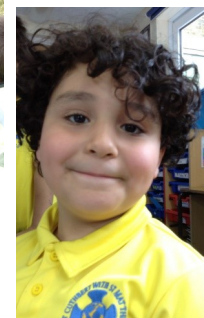

Ethan Y4 got awarded the Music Maestro certificate this week for giving great musical ideas and contributing to the group.

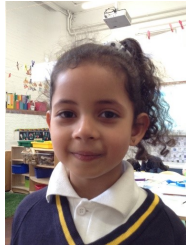

Year 4’s Blog

Welcome to our fantastic learning for this week!

In Maths, we have currently been learning about 2D shapes. We

wrote sentences about identifying lines of symmetry within 2D shapes, exploring symmetry in shapes of different sizes and orientations. A line of symmetry is when you divide a shape horizontally, vertically and diagonally. Also we used mirrors to help us find lines of symmetry in the shapes. Finally, we accurately completed figures in our maths books.

In Art, we are learning about “Sculpture”. Before we started our new mind map, we recalled about “Still Life” that we had learnt. Still Life has to have lots of detail and you can use paints oil pastels, collage and pencils to mark still life. Paul Cézanne is a famous artist who creates still life artwork.

Sculpture can be very colourful, they can also look like humans, animals and any other objects. It could be made out of clay, tinfoil, cigarettes and wires. We also researched facts from the biographies about famous artists and observed and compared works and sculptures from different artists e.g. Augusta Savage- Augusta was born in a leap year February 29, 1892 – March 27. We gave our opinion about various sculptures.

In RE, we learnt how important each of the elements of liturgy are. We researched about some different topics like “The Eucharistic Prayer” The first question was “What is it?” e.g. The Eucharistic Prayer is a part of the Divine Liturgy of the holy sacrifice of the Mass. Bread and wine is blessed and given to the people in the church. The second question was “Where does it take place? How does it take place?” The Eucharistic prayer takes place in a church, often lead by a Bishop.

In Geography, we have been learning about sketch maps. We drew a sketch map of Baska Nodaport, Croatia. We made a key including water, trees, settlements, roads, boats, sand, bushes and marinas. Also we wrote ‘not to scale’. ‘Not to scale’ means it doesn’t have a lot of detail and it is not the same size as the real thing. We also drew a map of our local area “Earls Court”. We included our school, Earls Court Square, Hotel Olympia and much more! After we had finished our sketch maps we made a list of land use e.g. transport: train, bike, car, scooter and walking.

Well done to all these pupils on keeping their energy levels on full-speed as we hurtle through the final days of summer term.

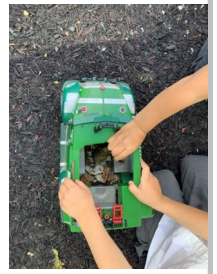

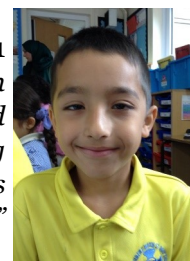

Year 5's entertaining blog

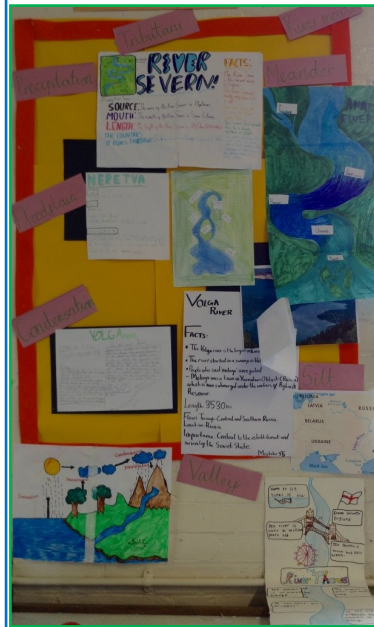
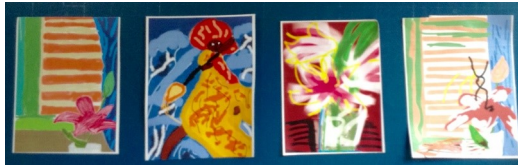
In Maths we learnt about lengths and angles in shapes. We also discussed about parallel lines and how they are different to perpendicular lines in relation to rectangles and other shapes. We also explored regular and irregular polygons. The difference is, a regular shape is when all sides and angles are equal, such as a square, a hexagon and a pentagon. Whereas irregular is when all the angles and sides are not equal.

In Geography we continue to learn about rivers. We looked at rivers in Europe and the pollution they cause. We went through a PowerPoint explaining how we can stop the effect it has on the environment. We then wrote a persuasive letter to Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, urging him to take action to prevent river pollution. We are also making a 3D model of a river from the source to the mouth of the river for our home learning project.

In English on the 1st of February we wrote a traditional tale that some volunteers sent to us. This week we rewrote it in a story format after we got into different groups.

In RE we researched more places of worship in our borough and what different services they provide. We looked at how they help their communities by using charity. We found out that some of the churches in our area have food banks that help people struggling to buy food. Just like our own St Cuthbert church. One of the mosques in the area strives to make Kensington and Chelsea a better place for everyone.

In Art we continue to do digital art. We finally made our own art inspired by David Hockney and Davida Enara. We used an app called Brushes Redux. Some of us who were more confident drew more complicated images. *By Mark and Aiden*



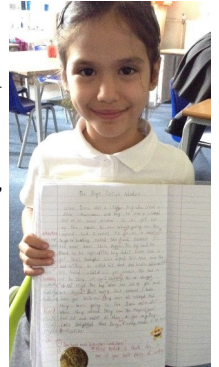
Year 5's incredible display of Geography home learning project about rivers in Europe.

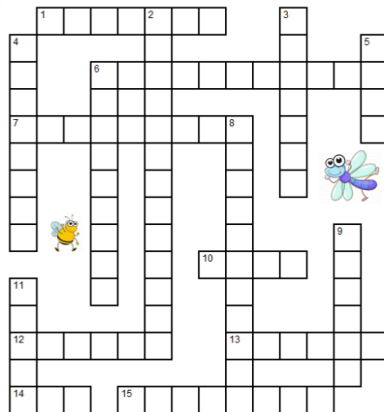
DOUBLE PARKING

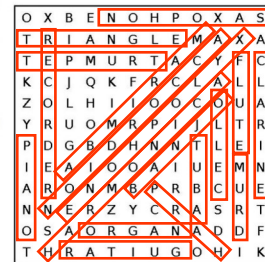
